Meander Through Deloraine: Tasmania's Slow Travel Secret

While Tasmania has captured the imagination of foodies, hikers, and slow-travel seekers, Meander Valley remains an under-the-radar treasure. Anchored by the storybook town of Deloraine at the foot of the Great Western Tiers, this region blends artisan culture, pastoral beauty, local produce, deep community spirit, and some of the clearest night skies you'll ever see.

Tempted by Tasmania's "Come Down for Air" campaign, my partner and I finally booked a trip. Our wishlist was simple: nature, short scenic walks, cozy accommodation, local food and wine, and maybe a fireplace and hot tub. The <u>Discover Tasmania App</u> pointed us to Deloraine—and we couldn't have made a better choice.

A Place Where Time Slows Down

Just 40 minutes from Launceston Airport, the drive winds through farmland and historic villages until Deloraine appears beside the Meander River, with Kooparoona Niara—the Great Western Tiers—rising behind it. Sunsets drape the valley in dusky pinks and blues and on clear nights, you might even glimpse the Southern Lights.

Deloraine's main street brims with charm: heritage buildings, art studios, sculpture trails, cozy cafes, and welcoming pubs. It's small-town life with big soul.

Flavour and Firelight

We began our journey at the <u>Great Western Tiers Visitor Centre</u>, which houses the <u>Deloraine and District Folk</u> <u>Museum</u>. Outside, the Pioneer Walk honours the tenacity of early settlers. Hunger took us to <u>Frank and Lottie's</u>, where Portuguese tarts made us instant regulars. Just down the street, <u>Deloraine Deli</u> offers Tassie cheeses and local chutneys and platters to take home - perfect for an evening of wine and grazing back at our accommodation.

And what a stay it was. <u>Cedar Cottage Meander</u> is a peaceful retreat with a veggie patch, lush gardens, and a wood-fired hot tub under the stars. It was exactly the kind of place that reminds you why you travel—to slow down, breathe deeply, and to feel part of a place. Heading

A Community with Heart

There's a rhythm in Meander Valley—slower, but richer. It's in the morning 'hello' from a farmer, in locals swapping stories outside the bakery, in the way a barista takes time to recommend a local favourite walk. People here don't just tell you where to visit—they tell you why they love it.

We followed the <u>Sculpture Trail</u> along the main street and picked up produce from honesty boxes filled with apples, jams, and home-baked bread. From raspberries at <u>Christmas Hills Raspberry Farm</u> to sausages at <u>Best's Butchery</u>, truffles from <u>The Truffle Farm Tasmania</u>, cool climate wines from <u>Meander Valley Vineyard</u> and apple cider at <u>Little Green Men Brewing Co</u>, everything tasted as it should: full of flavour, heart, and local pride.





Nature on Every Path

Nature here is never far. Meander Valley calls itself Tasmania's "<u>Short Walks Capital</u>," and it delivers. The Deloraine River Walk was an easy intro, winding alongside clear water. Liffey Falls and Parsons Falls, surrounded by lush forest, were absolute highlights. Though we didn't get to Meander Falls this trip, locals say it's stunning in winter, when the cascades freeze.

One unforgettable walk took us to <u>Tulampunga/Alum</u> <u>Cliffs</u>, an Aboriginal sacred site overlooking the dramatic gorge of the Mersey River. We arrived in mist; by the time the view revealed itself, it felt like we'd stepped into a dreamscape of beauty and wonder.

Eager for wildlife, we visited <u>Trowunna Wildlife</u> <u>Sanctuary</u>, where wombats, quolls, and Tasmanian devils are cared for by passionate local guides. The experience was intimate and educational—one of those rare encounters that stays with you long after you leave.

Other must-visits include the goats at <u>Little Things</u> <u>Farm</u>, the glow worm-lit <u>Mole Creek Caves</u>, and a stop at the <u>Mole Creek Hotel</u> for its legendary Tassie Tiger Pie. For something slower-paced, the <u>Empire Hotel's</u> platypus tour is an ideal wind-down—gentle, magical, and quietly thrilling.





Creative Soul, Historic Heart

Deloraine hums with creativity. At <u>Deloraine Creative Studios</u>, we met artists at work, wandered art galleries and antique stores, while the <u>Silk Yarns Exhibition</u>—a vast handwoven tapestry—told the story of the town and its people with breathtaking intricacy. The town is a canvas—its history, art, and people intertwined.

The Joy of Meandering

The true charm of Meander Valley lies not in checking off an itinerary but in savouring the journey. It's not about checking sights off a list. It's about the moments between—when you linger by a river, talk with a stranger, or stumble on a hidden waterfall just off the road. It's a place that rewards curiosity and presence.

Tasmania dazzles with its wild beauty, but Meander Valley whispers a different kind of wonder. It invites you to travel not just across a landscape, but into a slower, deeper way of being. Deloraine, you don't just visit—you meander.

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
